As balm for troubled times we offer vintage ambulance consults with the **Emergency Poet**; present jazz and spoken word, Coward cabaret, a hip-hop verse off with **Omar Musa** and King Kapisi, the lyrics of Tusiata Avia and Maxine Beneba Clarke, and the tenth Poetry Idol.

Liz Pichon and The Topp Twins head up events for younger readers, joined by wonderful writers including John Boyne, Edward Carey, Michael Grant and Jane Higgins.

Not to mention gold medal-winning hockey players, Maori artists, crime novelists, filmmakers, historians, memoirists, illustrators, travellers and much, much more.

Autumn might be setting in on Auckland but our spirits are high. The world is a fascinating and complex place - let's read it large in May.

## SCHOOLS PROGRAMME
