This world is full of great stories and so will the Aotea Centre be in May as we welcome some of the world's best storytellers to our Festival stage.

Alice Walker, Alexander McCall Smith, Eleanor Catton, Irvine Welsh, Sandi Toksvig, Lloyd Jones, A.M. Homes, John Marsden, Keri Hulme, Tim Finn, Patricia Grace, Michael Leunig, Camilla Lackberg and Sir Ray Avery line up alongside fellow novelists, poets, scientists, journalists, adventurers, architects, artists, filmmakers and musicians to help us discover the world anew.

A light will be shone around the globe including on Egypt, Australia, Everest, China and the very fascinating North Korea which is examined both through the Pulitzer Prize winning fiction of **Adam Johnson** and the hot-off-the-press memoir of inner circle defector **Jang Jin-sung**.

Following a year where stories of surveillance and gender dominated the public discourse, writers will debate the merits of privacy and deliver a powerhouse discussion on the position of women.

Music's powers of narration will wow in three special performance events, as well as at a session in memory of Hello Sailor's **Dave McArtney**, chaired by **Karyn Hay**. The brilliance of Jane Austen will be honoured in the one woman play *Austen's Women* and we'll send 30 strangers out to create tales of the night on a Midnight Run with performer, poet and playwright **Inua Ellams**.

There are exclusive opportunities to be entertained by loved writers Nicky Pellegrino and Sarah-Kate Lynch at Toto; take tea with novelists Owen Marshall, Jenny Pattrick and Fiona Kidman or go awol over lunch with explorer Huw Lewis-Jones at the Langham; and hang out at hot Auckland joint Ostro with Michelinstarred chef Josh Emett.

The Great Kiwi Classic book club will re-consider ground breaking novel *The Bone People*, thirty years after publication; **Sam Hunt** will announce the inaugural winner of the *Sarah Broom Poetry Prize* and the Festival introduces new, free Family Day events, for our younger audience, including live drawing, storytelling and a reading of *The Little Yellow Digger* by author **Betty Gilderdale**.

There really is no place else to be in May but here with us – come along and get the full story.
