There are guests from New Zealand, Australia, India, Russia, Sri Lanka, Italy, Spain, the United States. the Pacific and Great Britain. All will bring their magic to the stage, ideas swirling out from between their lines to capture your hearts and minds.

This year we've increased our free programme to include readings session each afternoon, and created a book valuations event where you can bring your prized volumes in for an on-the-spot valuation or just simply gather to watch others share their treasures. In partnership with ATC a Festival play will take shape, with audience input, across Saturday.

We've also added two intimate evening concerts – Bill Manhire's poems set to glorious music, and Leonard Cohen biographer Sylvia Simmons in a jam session with our own Don McGlashan; and there's a stirring debate with audience as interrogator and judge, alongside our high-energy, high-stakes gala storytelling event.

It's all here on stage for five days in May. Good times, great ideas. The secret's out – come and share the magic.


