The Auckland Writers Festival | Waituhi o Tāmaki, with the generous support of the Freemasons Foundation, is delighted to deliver our 16th annual Schools Programme | Hōtaka Kura in May 2024.

Designed to inspire young readers and writers, our Schools Programme engages and entertains more than 6,000 Year 5-13 students each year and is an exciting opportunity for our tamariki and rangatahi to both connect with the people behind the books they already know and love, and discover new voices. This year features inspirational writers from across New Zealand and the world in three jam-packed days of sessions and workshops tailored for primary, intermediate and secondary school students.

With the generous support of the Freemasons Foundation we are able to keep Schools Programme ticketing prices accessible, provide the *Read The World* publication, offer book tokens and deliver our Pukapuka Adventures family weekend.

CHOOSE YOUR DATE

This year we are offering four sessions a day for Years 5-6 (14, 15 or 16 May), Years 7-8 (14 May) and Years 9-13 (15 or 16 May).

COST

We believe books and ideas should be accessible to all, so we work closely with partners to keep ticket prices low. Day attendance (four x 45-minute sessions) is \$13 per student; workshop places (one hour) are \$16 per student. Teachers attend FREE of charge. Books are available for purchase at the Festival Bookshop and writers will be available to sign books in the breaks.

Pouākai, haere mai! Taniwha, kia kaha!

TIM TIPENE

Meet Pipi and Pou, two cousins that can shapeshift into a fierce taniwha and mighty Pōuakai, eagle. With guidance from their no-nonsense Nan, they protect and guard the natural world, save lives and overcome dangers. **Tim Tipene**'s (Ngāti Kurī, Te Uri-o-Hau) series uses the superhero genre and epic illustrations as a hook to engage the most reluctant of readers. From calming a furious mountain to solving mysteries of monsters in the ngāhere, hear what inspires Tim to create these brilliant tales and how to unlock the superhero in all of us.



Wandering and Wondering GISELLE CLARKSON


Ever heard of observology? It's the study of looking more closely at the small things around you and being drawn in by the world's tiny wonders – it's also a perfect boredom buster. **Giselle Clarkson**, observologist, illustrator and 2023 Arts Laureate, has launched many scientific expeditions and spent a lot of time gazing at the ground. In her book *The Observologist* she puts 100 small creatures and features of the natural world under the microscope, blending science with humour and illustration. Giselle will speak about how she has combined her two passions of comics and conservation to create a career, and will get you giggling with crazy facts about everyday creatures.



My Classmate's a Secret Agent JASON GUNN

Join master of comedy and thrills, **Jason Gunn**, as he speaks about his wacky, action-packed *Jason Mason* series, co-written with his brother, Andrew Gunn. Jason Mason is an unlikely hero who on the surface seems like a pretty average kid, the kind of kid who gets to play a dog in the school play, but what most of the world doesn't know is Jason Mason is a secret agent. (*Shhhh, maybe keep that quiet*). In this session, author Jason Gunn will provide tips on how to tell a riveting adventure story and have your readers in stitches. If you're lucky, he'll also share anecdotes from his exciting life, and what it's like working with his brother.





A Story to Tell MARYAM MASTER

Maryam Master crafts stories with heart and humour that don't shy away from life's tough parts. As well as being an award-winning novelist, Maryam writes for both theatre and television, with her stage adaptations of David Walliams books touring extensively throughout Australia. Her novel No Words, which is based on her own experience as a refugee building a new life in Australia, won a list of Australian book awards including the 2023 Peace Literature Award. Maryam will discuss her childhood in Iran, having to flee her hometown and forging a new life in Australia, and how this experience has influenced her writing and why she chooses to write about tough topics.

Upper Primary Sessions: About the Authors

Tim Tipene

As a child **Tim** was adopted into the Waitai Tipene family, and raised in two cultures, NZ Māori and NZ European. His tribal affiliations are Ngāti Kuri and Te Uri-o-Hau. First published in 1996, Tim is an award-winning author of children's picture books and junior novels, including the Pipi and Pou series and *The Book That Wouldn't Read*. In 2023 *Pipi and Pou and the Raging Mountain* was a finalist for the NZ Book Awards for Children and YA while *Pipi and Pou and the Tentacles of the Deep* was a Storylines Notable Junior Fiction. In 1994 Tim created *Warrior Kids*, a self control and social skills programme for children and teens, which he ran for 28 years in schools and communities, changing the lives of young people and their families. A trained counsellor with a graduate certificate in Child and Adolescent Mental Health, Tim also holds multiple Black Belt Ranks and teaching titles in various Martial Arts.

Jason Gunn

Jason Gunn is a New Zealand television presenter, director and writer. He is best known for co-hosting hit show *Dancing With The Stars*, and game shows *The Rich List* and *Wheel of Fortune*. Jason got his start in children's television, becoming a household name with *Jase TV* and the longrunning *Son of a Gunn Show*. Gunn credits his parents for their acceptance and encouragement. On family drives Gunn would often provide entertainment from the back seat. "They'd let me practise my stories and impersonations and funny voices, and get me to entertain visitors."

Giselle Clarkson

Giselle Clarkson is an award-winning author, illustrator and cartoonist living in South Wairarapa. In 2023 she was made an Arts Foundation Te Tumu Toi Laureate, receiving the Mallinson Rendel Illustrators Award for an outstanding contribution to New Zealand children's books. Giselle blends humour with detailed observation and a bold immediacy to achieve her signature style. She is a regular contributor to the NZ School Journal, NZ Geographic magazine, children's literature website The Sapling, and once experienced viral success with an illustrated poster of NZ baked goods. Her bestselling nonfiction book The Observologist: A Handbook for Mounting Very Small Scientific Expeditions (Gecko Press) is her first as both author and illustrator, and was released in October 2023 to international acclaim.

Maryam Master

Maryam's novel *Exit Through the Gift Shop* was shortlisted for the Prime Minister's Literary Awards. Her second novel, *No Words*, won the Readings Prize and the Children's Peace Literature Award. She's adapted four of David Walliams' books for the stage. TV credits include *Home and Away* and *Elmo's Australian tour*



Tackling the Big StuffMARYAM MASTER

Award-winning novelist, screenwriter and playwright **Maryam Master** is renowned for approaching hard topics with a big heart. In her first novel *Exit Through The Gift Shop* she tackles big ideas: life, death and what it means to be human. Her most recent novel *No Words* is a story closer to home and is based on her own experiences as a refugee fleeing Iran when she was nine years old and making a new home in Australia. Maryam discusses her life journey, the power of words, and how writing can transform lives.





Spellbinding TalesRACHAEL KING

Rachael King's gripping novel, *The Grimmelings*, is steeped in old magic and adventure. It follows thirteen-year-old Ella as she and her beloved pony Magpie attempt to break the curse laid by a vengeful Kelpie, a black horse-like creature that is threatening not just her family but the whole community. Rachael is well known in the Aotearoa literary industry as a writer, festival director and reviewer. Her first children's novel, *Red Rocks*, won her the Esther Glen Medal in 2013, and is soon to be a television series. Join Rachael as she discusses how her passion for Scottish folklore and riding horses came together to create this mesmerising book, and how you too can use your passions to fuel your writing.






Wot Knot You Got? SELINA TUSITALA MARSH

Maryam Master

Maryam's novel *Exit Through the Gift Shop* was shortlisted for the Prime Minister's Literary Awards. Her second novel, *No Words*, won the Readings Prize and the Children's Peace Literature Award. She's adapted four of David Walliams' books for the stage. TV credits include *Home and Away* and *Elmo's Australian tour*.

Rachael King

Rachael King is a writer, reviewer and former literary festival director from Aotearoa New Zealand. She loves music and started playing bass guitar in rock bands when she was 15, but these days spends more time listening. When Rachael was young, she tried to ride every horse she met and could often be found galloping bareback along a beach with the wind in her hair. *The Grimmelings* is her second book for children; the first, *Red Rocks*, won the Esther Glen Medal in 2013 and is in development for television. Both novels reflect her love for, and obsession with, Scottish folklore – the weirder the better. Rachael has also published two novels for adults.

Selina Tusitala Marsh

Professor Selina Tusitala Marsh ONZM, FRSNZ is a former Commonwealth Poet, New Zealand Poet Laureate and acclaimed performer and author. She was the first Pacific Islander to graduate with a PhD in English from the University of Auckland and is now a Professor of English specialising in Pasifika literature. Her first collection, the bestselling Fast Talking PI, won the NZSA Jessie Mackay Award for Best First Book of Poetry in 2010. Her debut children's book and memoir, Mophead: How Your Difference Makes a Difference, was awarded the Margaret Mahy Book of the Year at the 2020 New Zealand Book Awards for Children and Young Adults and was followed by the bestselling Mophead Tu: The Queen's Poem. Her third book in her award-winning Mophead series, Wot Knot You Got? Mophead's Guide to Life, is a one-of-a-kind, hands-on playbook.

David Hill

David Hill was a teacher, soldier and woolstore worker before becoming a fulltime author. He has been earning a living from writing for over 40 years. His novels, stories and plays have been published or performed in several countries, including Japan, the US, England, France, China, and little Slovenia. He has won awards in Germany, France, the US and England. In New Zealand, he has won the Esther Glen Medal, the Margaret Mahy Medal, and the Children's Book Award for Junior or Senior Fiction. In 2021, he received the Prime Minister's Award for Fiction, and in the 2024 New Year's Honours, he was made a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit. But he feels the best award of all is if a reader says to him "I liked your book".

Dahlia Malaeulu

Dahlia Malaeulu is an award-winning author and publisher of Mila's Books - the only all Pasifika publishing company of children's books in the world. A proud Samoan New Zealander who has connections to the villages of Sinamoga, Vaivase tai, Fale atiu, Fagaloa and Aleisa in Sāmoa, Dahlia is passionate about the power of Pasifika stories. She is also an educator and literacy advocate. Dahlia currently serves on the Read NZ Te Pou Muramura Board and was the recipient of the Creative New Zealand 2022 Pasifika Emerging Pacific Artist Award, and the PANZ 2023 Emerging NZ Publisher of the Year Award.

Claire Mabey

Claire Mabey is writer, founder of Verb Readers and Writers Festival, LitCrawl Wellington and books editor at *The Spinoff*. She has worked at many arts and book festivals over the past 15 years and still feels passionate about the role of festivity in our lives. Claire is a book reviewer on *RNZ* and spends much of her life consumed by books. Her first novel is coming out in July 2024 with Allen & Unwin: it's a middle grade adventure novel about the magic of books, the importance of friendship and the secrets buried deep in families. Elizabeth Acevedo

Elizabeth Acevedo is a Dominican-American National Poetry Slam Champion and *New York Times*-bestselling author. She is the author of the young adult novels *The Poet X*, *With the Fire on High* and *Clap When You Land. The Poet X* is a *New York Times* bestseller, winner of the National Book Award and the Carnegie Medal, and was shortlisted for the Waterstones Children's Book Prize. She was selected by The Poetry Foundation as the Young People's Poet Laureate of 2022.

Natalie Haynes

Natalie Haynes is a writer and broadcaster and – according to the Washington Post – a rock star mythologist. Her first novel, The Amber Fury, was published to great acclaim on both sides of the Atlantic, as was The Ancient Guide to Modern Life. Her second novel, The Children of Jocasta, was published in 2017. A Thousand Ships, was published in 2019. It was shortlisted for the Women's Prize for Fiction in 2020. Her non-fiction book, Pandora's Jar: Women in the Greek Myth was published in Oct 2020, and reached number 2 in the New York Times Bestseller chart. Her novel about Medusa, Stone Blind, was published in Sep 2022. Her latest book, Divine Might, was published in September 2023. She is a regular contributor to BBC Radio 4: nine series of her show, Natalie Haynes Stands Up for the Classics, have been broadcast on Radio 4.

Airana Ngarewa

Born and raised in Pātea - Poi E Country, **Airana Ngarewa** (Ngāti Ruanui, Ngā Rauru, Ngāruahine) is a secondary school teacher in New Plymouth and author of the bestselling novel *The Bone Tree*. He won the short story and poetry competitions at the Ronald Hugh Morrieson Literary Awards in 2022. His writing has also been published by *RNZ*, *NZ Herald*, *Newsroom* and *Landfall*.

Steph Matuku

Steph Matuku (Ngāti Tama, Ngāti Mutunga, Te Atiawa) is an award-winning author of stories for young people. As well as short stories, plays and articles, she has written five books: *Flight of the Fantail* and *Falling Into Rarohenga* for young adults, the junior fiction series, *Whetū Toa*, and picture book, *The Eight Gifts of Te Wheke*, all published by Huia Publishers. Two of her books have been translated into te reo Māori, two were finalists in the New Zealand Book Awards for Children and Young Adults, and four were Storylines Notable Books. Steph's screen credits include *Mystic*, *Under The Vines* and *Shortland Street*. She has three more books due out this year, and is currently working on a novel for young adults about the indigenous response to climate change. Steph is the mother of two, and lives in Taranaki.

Sophie Henderson

Sophie Henderson is a New Zealand screenwriter working in the UK and New Zealand. Her first screenplay, Fantail premiered at the Rotterdam Film Festival and picked up a People's Choice Award at Melbourne International Film Festival. In 2021 her film Baby Done with Taika Waititi's Piki Films starring Rose Matafeo and Matthew Lewis, won over audiences both at home and overseas. The same year, Sophie's film The Justice of Bunny King starring Essie Davis and Thomasin Mckenzie premiered at Tribeca Film Festival where it received a Nora Ephron Award Special Jury Mention. Sophie's most recent work includes writing Charles Upham's biopic Mark of The Lion for Lionsgate and Firefly Films, developing her series Wall with Southern Light Films and adapting a 1940s Beano comic book Valda: The Immortal Girl with Drama Republic for television. Her next feature, Workmates is currently in post-production and is due for release in 2024.

Amber Esau

Amber Esau is a Sā-Māo-Rish (Ngāpuhi / Manase) writer of things from Tāmaki Makaurau. She is a poet, storyteller, and professional bots. She is co-editor of Queer Poetry Anthology, Spoiled Fruit (Āporo press, 2023). Always vibing at a languid pace, her work has been published both in print and online including in Puna Wai Kōrero, Rapture, Te Awa o Kupu, Skinny Dip! and Annual, NZ poetry shelf, Ora nui, Poetry New Zealand Yearbook and Going West Poetry Videos. She is a recipient of the emerging Pasifika writer's residency from the Michael King Writers Centre and the ideas in residence residency from the Basement Theatre.

Deborah Robertson

Deborah Robertson grew up in rural Northland where she lived off the land with her family, riding a bunch of ponies that were at least half-human and volunteering for everything, including Scouts, Riding for the Disabled and various children's camps, which provided much of the inspiration for *Before George*. She divides her time between teaching, film work, writing, engineering and pottery and has a master's degree in Creative Writing. She has also made lots of (mostly not useless) things ranging from a house to way too many patchwork quilts, to hydrofoils to quirky clay animals. Deborah lives in Whangārei with her giant rabbits, a flock of sheep and her husband.

Zech Soakai

Zech Soakai is a storyteller and educator from Poutasi, Upolu, Samoa and Ha'ato'u, Ha'apai, Tonga. Raised in South Auckland, he considers his work as a writer, orator and educator significant in village building and warrior raising – so that his communities may continue to flourish. Zech is an award winning performance poet and was privileged to go on the Rhodes Poetry Retreat in Monolithos under the tutelage of Greek-Australian Poet Luka Lesson. His written works can be found in: Rapture: An Anthology of Performance Poetry in Aotearoa New Zealand (AUP, 2023) and Remember Me: Poems to Learn by Heart from Aotearoa New Zealand (AUP, 2023).
